Dr. John Obetz, internationally known organ recitalist, will appear 10-27-74 in concert this Sunday on the Quimby pipe organ at Warrensburg's First Christian Church.

The 7:30 p.m. performance is free to the public and will feature works by the English composer Henry Purcell, the Baroque organ master J. S. Bach and the contemporary French composer Langlais.

The recital, sponsored by the First Christian Church, is one in a continuing series that have been performed since the installation of the instrument last fall by local organ builder Michael Quimby.

Dr. Obetz is one of the most widely heard organist in the country.

He is featured weekly over 230 radio stations in a half hour program "The Auditorium Organ" which originates from the world headquarters of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints in Independence, Missouri. Dr. Obetz is heard locally on KCMW-FM, Sundays.

Obetz holds undergraduate and graduate degrees from Northwestern
University and a Doctorate in Sacred Music from Union Theological Seminary.

He has participated in the Internation Academy for Organist in Haarlem,
the Netherlands. He has performed throughout the United States and Europe,
and has appeared with the Aspen Festival Orchestra and the Kansas City
Philharmonic. Dr. Obetz has cut several records featuring the 109 rank,
6,400 pipe Auditorium Organ in Independence.

Dr. Obetz currently serves as chairman for a 10-state region for the American Guild of Organists and is a member of the faculty at the Conservatory of Music, University of Missouri at Kansas City.
