Organ Dedication

About the Organ

The pipe organ for St. Paul's Evangelical Church, created and built by Quimby Pipe Organs, Inc., is a two-manual instrument of 29 ranks based on an eclectic design. The concept does not copy any historical style of organ building. The tonal design is a synthesis, resulting in a concept that is distinctly American. The new organ replaces the 1961 Moller organ (14 ranks - 767 pipes).

The tonal specification was designed in consultation with Lois Percival, organist and director of music, and the six member organ committee. The instrument features Blackinton-Johnson style electro-pneumatic slider windchests and electro-pneumatic pouch windchests for the Festival Trumpet and pedal ranks.

The organ contains 1,641 pipes, of which 137 were retained from the previous instrument and revoiced for the new tonal specification. The metal pipes are constructed of various alloys of tin and lead for those shorter than 4' in length and a zinc alloy for pipes longer than 4' in length. Several ranks are constructed entirely of wood including the pipes of the pedal 16' Bourdon and 16-8' Gedeckt.

The visible casework is constructed of oak and contains polished zinc pipes with the mouths of polished tin on the left and right sides and polished tin for the center sections. Pipes 1-11 of the great 8' Principal and Super Octave are located in the organ case.

The Moller console from the previous installation was retained and refinished, but rebuilt with solid state controls. The key and stop functions are controlled by a solid state Peterson multiplex relay system. The solid state Peterson combination action has 32 levels of memory. A Peterson Complete MIDI (Musical Instrument Digital Interface) with sequence recorder has been provided.

About the Builder =

Michael Quimby, organ builder, received a Bachelor of Music Education degree (1973) and a Master of Arts degree in music history and literature with applied emphasis in organ (1975) from Central Missouri State University, Warrensburg. Mr. Quimby is a member of Pi Kappa Lambda national honor society of music and the American Institute of Organbuilders, of which he has served as president. Additionally, he served on the Board of Directors and as chair of the Ethics Committee for the AIO. He is a member of the American Guild of Organists, having served as dean of the greater Kansas City chapter, the Organ Historical Society, and the American Choral Directors Association.

He is president of the thirty year old firm of Quimby Pipe Organs, Inc. His company, which presently has fifteen full time employees, is a member of the Associated Pipe Organ Builders of America (APOBA) and specializes in building new pipe organs for churches, educational institutions, and auditoriums, as well as restoring and rebuilding older organs. It has a tuning and maintenance service area that covers all of Missouri, western Kansas, eastern Illinois, southern Iowa, portions of Arkansas and Oklahoma, and various other locations in the United States.

Mr. Quimby presently serves as organist at First United Methodist Church, Warrensburg, Missouri.

Guest Recitalist - Kevin Kissinger

Kevin Kissinger has played for numerous Catholic Parishes and served Lutheran, Episcopal, and United Methodist congregations for thirty years. From 1989 to 1999, he served as organist and organist/choir director for the Pontifical Choir of Kansas City, Missouri.

He majored in Organ Performance at the University of Missouri at Kansas City Conservatory of Music. During that time he studied pipe organ with Dr. James Evans. Besides the normal regiment of music theory and history, he took additional studies in composition and counterpoint. He received his Bachelor of Music degree in 1981. During his residency at UMKC, he became a close associate of another music major - Pastor Mark Friz.

In 1979 Kevin won the Missouri MTNA Collegiate Organ Competition, which was held in St. Louis, and in 1980 won the Greater Kansas City chapter of the American Guild of Organists student competition. In 1991 he earned the prestigious Associate American Guild of Organists (AAGO) certificate.

In 1992, Kevin joined Quimby Pipe Organs, Inc. as vice president of operations. In addition to management responsibilities, he specialized in the tonal aspects of organ design. During that time he performed in Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska, Connecticut, California, and Utah. He presented the Quimby proposal to St. Paul's Council in July 1997. He resigned from Quimby Pipe Organs in 1999 to return to a career in Information Technology. A versatile church musician, he is in demand as a guest organist and continues to play in the Kansas City area.

Prior to his work with Quimby Pipe Organs, he spent a decade in the data processing industry during which time he earned the CDP (Certificate in Data Processing) professional certificate. He is currently a Systems Programmer/Analyst in support of the Airline Reservation Systems. Kevin has a well equipped MIDI (Musical Instrument Digital Interface) and digital audio recording studio in his home.

At home, Kevin enjoys spending time with his wife, Patricia, and six children who range in age from 3 months to sixteen years old.
