### About the organist

#### John Leavitt

John Leavitt is a Kansas native, born and raised in Leavenworth. He completed doctoral work in choral conducting at the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory of Music.

His undergraduate work is in music education from Emporia State University. After graduation, Dr. Leavitt moved to Wichita, Kansas, where he worked in television for five years. At Wichita State University he persued a Master of Music degree in keyboard studies with significant study in composition.

While in Wichita, he directed the parish music program at Immanuel Lutheran Church, which he began in September 1994, and served on the faculty of Friends University, where he wonthe faculty award for teaching excellence in 1989. In the fall of 1992, Dr. Leavitt accepted a one-year teaching

appointment with Concordia College, Edmunton, Alberta, Canada, where he was director of choral activities and assistant professor of music. Dr. Leavitt's parish choir has been featured on the national broadcast of *The Lutheran Hour*. His organ playing can be heard weekly as his arrangement of *A Mighty Fortress* serves as the signature theme for *The Lutheran Hour* across North America.

Since returning in 1993 to Wichita, he has devoted himself to full-time composing and conducting. He is the artistic director and conductor of a professionally trained vocal ensemble known as The Master Arts Chorale. This year he founded The Master Arts Youth Chorale, a choral ensemble for children ages 7-12.

Dr. Leavitt's works receive wide acclaim and he has received The American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP) awards since 1991. In addition to his busy guest-conducting and workshop schedule, he writes many commissioned works each year.

It also has an extensive maintenance and tuning service. Mr. Quimby presently serves as organist at First United Methodist Church in Warrensburg, Missouri.
