THE ORGANIST

Terry Manspeaker, a native Washingtonian, has studied piano and organ for many years, including initial organ studies with Dr. Van Knauss of Columbia Union College while in high school, and two years of undergraduate work at Columbia Union College. He has also studied with Dr. Albert Russell, Organist of St. John's Church, Lafayette Square, in Washington, D.C. while at Columbia Union. He then transferred to the University of Maryland, and received a Bachelor's Degree in Music in 1979.

Mr. Manspeaker was organist at Georgia Avenue Christian Church in Wheaton, Maryland, Organist/Choir Director at St. Jane de Chantal Catholic Church in Bethesda, Maryland, and is currently Organist/Choir Director at St. Thomas Moore Catholic Church in Washington, D.C.

Mr. Manspeaker has performed weekly for the Lecture/Demonstration Series at the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C. and has presented recitals in several churches in the local area. His primary interest is in music in the Liturgy of the Catholic Church, and he has worked in that field for 12 years.

OUR CONSULTANT

Irving Lawless, born and raised in McLean, Virginia, is a native of the Washington D.C. area. He attended Shenandoah Conservatory where he earned degrees in both music education and church music.

After leaving the Conservatory he taught choral music at McLean High School. Following that, Mr. Lawless was employed by the Aeolian Skinner Company in Boston where he learned organ building and maintenance. It was while with that company that he installed the large organs in the National Presbyterian Church and the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts.

In recent years, Mr. Lawless has created his own company and builds and maintains organs in the greater metropolitan area as well as maintaining organs at Interlochen, Michigan and in Bermuda.

Each week, Mr. Lawless leads a Lecture/Demonstration Series on the Kennedy Center organ.

THE ORGAN BUILDER

Michael Quimby, organ builder, received a B.M.E. degree in 1973 and his M.A. in music history and literature with applied emphasis in organ in 1975 from Central Missouri State. Mr. Quimby is a member of Pi Kappa Lambda, national honor society of music; the American Guild of Organists; The American Institute of Organ Builders; The organ Historical Society; and the American Choral Directors Association. He has a growing organ business which includes a tuning and maintenance service as well as building new organs, restoring and rebuilding older organs. Mr. Quimby is curator of the R.L.D.S. Auditorium organ in Independence, Missouri. He is presently serving as organist at the First United Methodist Church in Warrensburg, Missouri.
